IK-12 PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

The goal of a Career Prep program is to prepare career and technical education students for the transition from secondary to post-secondary education.

Moraine Park continues to be a leader in the state of Wisconsin for transcripted credit opportunities for in-district high schools. There has been a continuous evolution of articulation agreement development, career planning, curriculum development, joint in-service training for teachers and counselors, joint secondary and postsecondary programs, and the involvement of business and industry in K-12 activities at Moraine Park.

Moraine Area Career Prep Partnership Meetings

The Moraine Area Career Prep Consortium meets twice annually in an effort to share information relative to articulated courses, changes to Moraine Park programs and the development of Programs of Study. Consortium meetings focus on developing shared resources for school districts, career pathways, the needs of under-prepared learners, seamless educational opportunities for students and articulation agreements.

Career Prep Cluster Focused Workshops

The Career Prep Cluster Focused Workshops are designed for high school teachers and technical college instructors and deans to collaborate with the goal of developing advanced standing and/or transcripted credit courses with a focus on alignment of curriculum.

Administrator Breakfast

The Administrator Breakfast provides an opportunity for K-12 administrators to dialogue with Moraine Park Administration to investigate available opportunities for high schools. Moraine Park updates and other valuable information is presented, with a focus on new initiatives and collaborations that Moraine Park has established with area high schools. The breakfast provides an in-depth look into Moraine Park and the technical college system, including financial aid and admissions updates, ACCUPLACER placement test information and high school enrollment data.

Counselor In-Service

The Counselor In-Service is an opportunity for high school and middle school counselors to learn about program changes, participate in hands-on presentations and network with colleagues at this half-day workshop.

■ TRANSCRIPTED CREDIT & ADVANCED STANDING

High school students have the opportunity to earn college credit while in high school. Transcripted credit courses are Moraine Park courses taught in the high school using technical college curriculum, grading policies and textbooks. The courses are taught by a certified high school instructor. These credits are transferable to all schools within the Wisconsin Technical College System and may also transfer to four-year colleges. Advanced Standing agreements provide high school students the opportunity to earn college credit, primarily in core academiccourses, by successfully completing the course with a grade of B or better and enrolling in one of the 16 technical colleges after high school graduation.

YOUTH OPTIONS

The Youth Options Program is an opportunity for students in 11th and 12th grade and currently enrolled in a Wisconsin public high school to attend a Wisconsin postsecondary institution for the purpose of taking one or more courses for high school and college credit. Students must be in good academic standing for the school board to approve youth options.

High school students may enroll in regular occupational/ technical courses and/or general education courses that satisfy the requirements of an associate of applied science degree or technical diploma program. Technical college remedial programs and courses are not eligible options under this program.

Steps to Participate

- 1. Students should talk with staff at the high school and the postsecondary institution and decide on an appropriate course or courses.
- 2. By March 1 for the fall semester, and October 1 for the spring semester, students must notify the school board of their intent to participate in the program by completing the PI-8700A (Program Plan and Report form at www.dpi.state.wi.us/forms/pdf/pod8700-a.pdf).
- 3. Submit PI-8700A form to the school district by the deadline date. Be sure to list all courses and alternate courses.

■ K-12 STUDENT OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

Career Tours (Grades 10-12)

Area schools are invited to bring students, grades 10-12, to the Fond du Lac campus to learn about programs. High school staff is required to preregister students. Students choose two program areas to visit and will receive a presentation about admissions, financial aid, college services and further career exploration. Space is limited to 260 students.

College Preview Days (Grades 11-12)

College Preview Days help students sort out technical college options. This event is an excellent opportunity for high school students to explore postsecondary options available at Moraine Park. Students select specific programs to visit, see the classrooms and labs, talk with program instructors and hear a presentation on the student services available.

Discover Moraine Park (Grades 9-12)

Discover Moraine Park is a great opportnity for high school students and their parents to learn about the many programs the College has to offer. The event provides for students and parents to meet College staff, take a tour of the campus and learn about the steps to becoming a Moraine Park student.

Presentations

Challenging jobs, competitive salaries and in-demand skills and are just a few of the great reasons that futures take shape at Moraine Park. Moraine Park staff will visit the high school classroom for a fun and informative presentation to help students understand what technical college is all about. In an effort to serve district high schools better, the recruitment staff has increased their availability to collaborate with our high schools to make things more convenient for their students and, in turn, raise awareness about Moraine Park.

Presentation length and information are tailored to each audience and may include discussions and activities.

ACCUPLACER Test Sessions (Grade 11)

Moraine Park staff will come to your high school and proctor the ACCUPLACER placement test free to all juniors. This provides students the opportunity to get a feel for the assessment, as well as identify any potential needs for remedial
