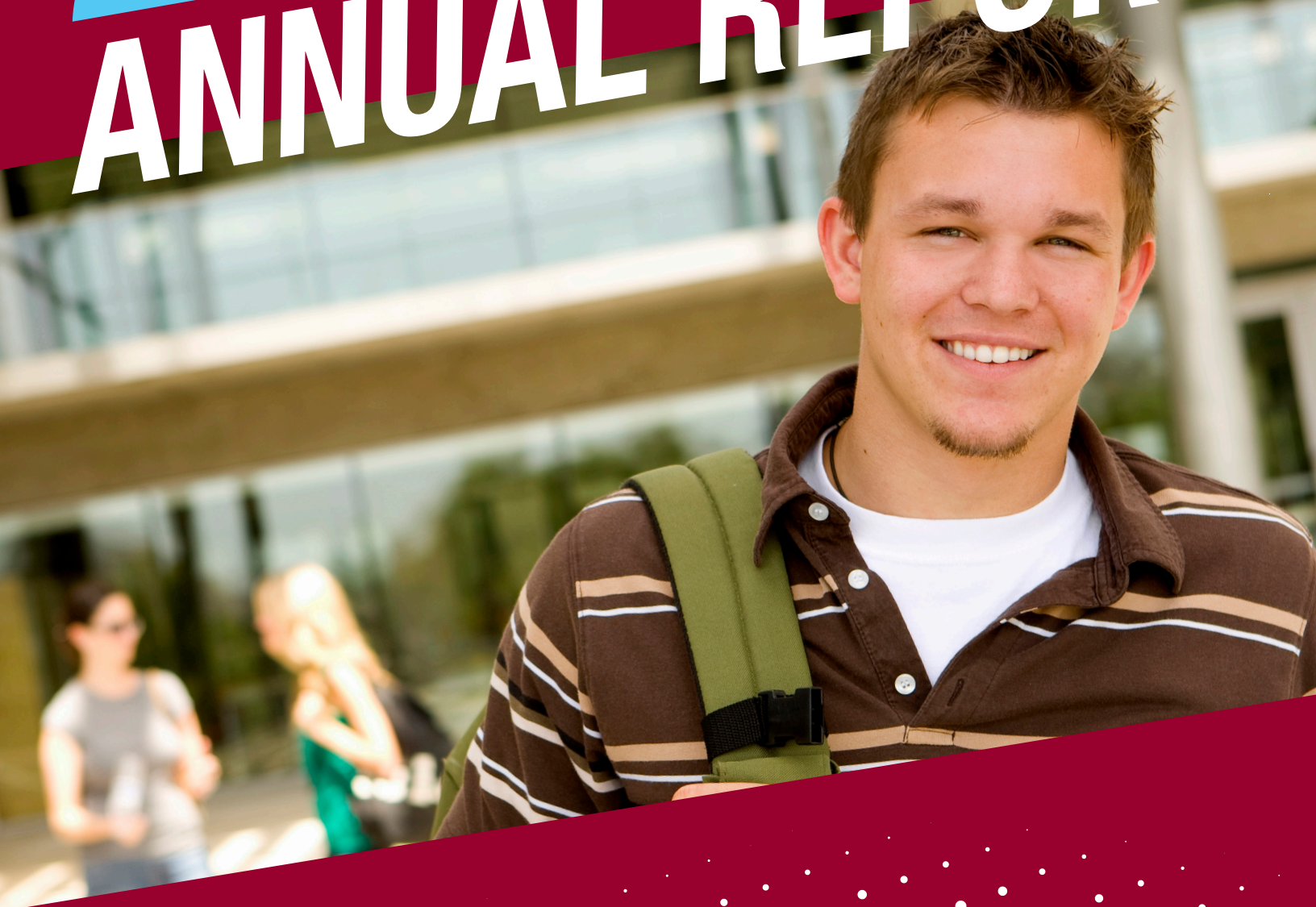


DEAR FELLOW EDUCATORS

Moraine Park continues to be a leader in the state of Wisconsin for transcribed credit opportunities for its district high schools. There has been a continuous evolution of articulation agreement development, career planning, curriculum development, joint in-service training for teachers and counselors, joint secondary and postsecondary programs, and the involvement of business and industry in K-12 activities at Moraine Park.

CAREER PREP GRANT 2012-13 OUTCOMES

- Maintain/increase the number of secondary education students who successfully complete, as a secondary school Career Prep student, courses that award post-secondary credit at the secondary level.
 - o 4,675 high school students were awarded 11,292 transcribed credits in 2012-13.
 - o This represents an increase of 808 students (21%) and 2,128 (23%) credits earned from 2011-2012.
- Maintain/increase the number of secondary Career Prep students who, upon graduation from high school, enroll in postsecondary education in the same field or major as the secondary student was enrolled at the secondary level.
 - o 54% of 2011 high school graduates enrolled in the same career pathway they were pursuing in high school at Moraine Park in 2011-12.
 - o This 3% decrease from 2012 high school graduates reflects expected fluctuations. Moraine Park continues to focus efforts on a new Career Coach model designed to enhance high school course planning and career direction. This aligns well with new legislation mandating all students beginning in 6th grade will have an academic and career plan by 2017.
- Maintain/Increase awareness of Career Clusters, Programs of Study and Career Development in collaboration with K-12 partners, business and industry, CESA's, and other stakeholders.
 - o Moraine Park offered and collaborated on more than 80 activities to Career Prep stakeholders.
 - o High school faculty participation increased 23% from 2011-12.
 - o Recruiters also touched more than 160 high school students with in-class development of academic and career plans in 2012-13 (new initiative).

K-12 PROFESSIONAL LEARNING ACTIVITIES

Moraine Area Career Prep Partnership Meetings

The Moraine Area Career Prep Consortium meets annually to share information relative to articulated courses, changes to Moraine Park programs and the development of Career Pathways. Meetings focus on:

- Developing shared resources for school districts
- Career pathways
- Seamless educational opportunities for students
- Career Prep course articulation agreements

Career Prep Cluster Focused Workshops

The Career Prep Cluster Focused Workshops are designed for high school teachers and technical college instructors and deans to collaborate on the development of advanced standing and/or transcribed credit courses with a focus on alignment of curriculum. In 2013, 81 high school educators attended one of the offerings below, representing an increase of 26 percent participation from 2012:

- Welding
- Culinary Arts
- Automotive Technology
- Building Trades, Electricity and HVAC
- Business and Information Technology
- Early Childhood Education and Health



YOUTH OPTIONS

The Youth Options program is an opportunity for students in 11th and 12th grade and currently enrolled in a Wisconsin public high school to attend a Wisconsin postsecondary institution for the purpose of taking one or more courses for high school and college credit. Students must be in good academic standing for the school board to approve Youth Options.

High school students may enroll in regular occupational/technical courses and/or general education courses that satisfy the requirements of an associate of applied science degree or technical diploma program. Technical college remedial programs and courses are not eligible options under this program.

Students interested in participating in the program should talk with staff at the high school and the postsecondary institution to decide on an appropriate course or courses. By March 1 for the fall semester, and October 1 for the spring semester, the student must notify the school board of their intent to participate in the program. This is accomplished by completing the PI-8700A (Program Plan and Report form) and submitting it to the school district by the deadline date. The student should list all courses and alternate courses he or she might take.

Administrator Breakfast

The Administrator Breakfast provides an opportunity for K-12 administrators to dialogue with Moraine Park Administration to investigate available opportunities for high schools. Moraine Park updates and other valuable information is presented, with a focus on new initiatives and collaborations that the College has established with area high schools. The event provides an in-depth look into Moraine Park and the technical college system.

- 31 K-12 administrators
- 22 public and private schools represented

Counselor In-Service

The Counselor In-Service brings high school and middle school counselors to a Moraine Park campus to learn about program changes, participate in hands-on presentations and network with colleagues at this half-day workshop.

- 38 middle and high school counselors
- 2 program visits: Welding and Culinary Arts

Business, Industry, and Education Day (BIE Day)

In March of 2014, Moraine Park, in partnership with the Fond du Lac Area Association of Commerce, Marian University, and UW Fond du Lac, sponsored BIE Day. The goal of BIE Day was to facilitate conversations among participants that establish new partnerships between business and education, provide high-quality training opportunities, and create an on-going network designed to prevent the significant decline of skilled workers in the Moraine Park district.

- 134 total attendees
- 86 participants from K-12 education through 4-year colleges
- 48 participants from Business and Industry

TRANSCRIPTED CREDIT

Transcribed credit provides high school students the opportunity to earn college credit while in high school. Transcribed credit courses are Moraine Park courses taught in the high school using technical college curriculum, grading policies and textbooks. The courses are taught by a certified high school instructor. These credits are transferable to all schools within the Wisconsin Technical College System and may also transfer to four-year colleges.

K-12 STUDENT OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

College Preview Days (Grades 11-12)

College Preview Days was held in November and offered high school junior and senior students from area high schools the opportunity to explore postsecondary options available at Moraine Park. Students selected two specific programs to visit, experienced classrooms and labs, spoke with program instructors and learned about student services available after high school graduation.

- 242 11th and 12th grade students attended
- 64 sessions offered by MPTC faculty

Career Showcase (Grades 9-12 & Adults)

Career Showcase offered high school students and their parents a preview of many different careers. Over 120 prospective students learned about the many programs the College has to offer through hands-on activities and dialogue with college faculty and staff.

CAMPUS EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

K-12 STUDENT OUTREACH ACTIVITIES (CONT.)

Discover Moraine Park (Grades 11-12 & Adults)

Discover Moraine Park, a college exploration event, commemorates Career and Technical Education Month each year. Over 200 prospective students and their families attended in 2014 to visit with student services representatives, instructors and deans to “fast track” their admission and financial aid processes for the upcoming school year.

High School Visits

Recruitment Specialists visit high schools monthly to help students and parents with career and college planning. Moraine Park Recruitment Specialists hold the Global Career Development Facilitator Certification. They assist with connections to MPTC opportunities for high school students, career and lifestyle interest exploration, and matching college programs that fit career interests, college admissions and applications, financial aid and scholarship information and transfer opportunities between colleges.

- Over 400 high school students met with during the 2013-14 school year
- 357 2014 high school graduates submitted applications

ACCUPLACER Test Sessions (Grades 11-12)

During the 2013-14 academic year, Moraine Park Recruitment staff proctored ACCUPLACER test sessions at Moraine Park district high schools. These sessions allow students to experience the assessment process, as well as identify any potential needs for remedial skill development.

- 727 11th and 12th grade students
- 22 high schools

Passport to Your Future

Passport to Your Future, an event geared for students in 8th grade, featured the opportunity to visit and explore careers that require a degree from a technical college. Career representatives from local companies met with students and provided examples of what they do in their jobs. There were also hands-on activities at tables and break-out sessions for students to attend.

- 13 middle schools attending
- 9 breakout sessions offering hands-on activities
- 12 career fair vendors
- 1,200 local 8th grade students

Tech Knowledge College

Tech Knowledge College is a three-day summer activity for students entering grades 6 through 8. Students choose two career areas to explore. In 2013, 185 middle school students participated in this opportunity.

TRANSFER TO A FOUR-YEAR COLLEGE - IT HAS NEVER BEEN EASIER!

Students who earn associate of applied science degree-level credits at Moraine Park can transfer to a four-year college to earn a bachelor's degree. Please reference the chart for current agreements or visit the Moraine Park website for details on the many transfer agreements to four-year public and private colleges.

- Credits earned at Moraine Park must meet the requirements of the college where the students wish to transfer.
- Some colleges may accept the credits of an entire associate of applied science degree.
- Some colleges may accept technical diploma-level courses.
- Always check with the receiving college to confirm which Moraine Park courses will transfer.

Transferring Resources

- Certain Moraine Park credits are accepted at the University of Wisconsin colleges.
- Check with the college for their most current credit transfer agreements.
